Summary and checklist

This week we explored the varied ways that health is conceptualised, and you were invited to share a photo that represents what health means to you and we considered the factors that influence our health and wellbeing through being introduced to the determinants of health model. We then considered why public health is a discipline and field of practice by examining the historical foundations of public health, the key successes of public health and the various charters and declarations that guide our work. The Global Charter for the Public's Health and the roles that public health practitioners play in the core functions (protection, prevention and promotion) and the enabling functions (governance, advocacy, capacity and information) was introduced. Next week we take a more in-depth look at these core services and enabling functions to critique and compare the various approaches to public health.
